FLA Members Make NUHS History

This summer from July 3-10 two NUHS students will be competing at the Nationa FLA Convention, a feat never before accomplished at this school.

Senior Holly Oscarson and junior Anne Erickson will be among 75 students from Minnesota and countless others nationwide attending the National FLA Convention in New Orleans, Louisiana. Besides competing, they will also be attending meetings on leadership.

Oscarson and Erickson won the trip by putting together a display about the Santa's Closet project, which they organized. They competed with that display at Regionals, which was held in Blue Earth. At the Region #2 competition they received a gold raking, which is 90-100 points. Next they went on to the State competition where the duo gave a 15 minute speech to 3 judges about their projects and display. Their hard work payed off as they placed 1st in the state.

What is so unique about what these two have accomplished is that they are the first group from New Ulm's FLA Chapter to win 1st at State and go to compete at Nationals. To show how great an accomplishment this is, there were 1400 people competing in Minnesota alone; only 75 of those go to Nationals. Oscarson and Erickson were among about 35 other groups competing in the Chapter Service category.

Eagles Baseball

On Friday, May 8, I had the pleasure of sitting down and talking to the most victorious coach in Minnesota baseball history. In 35 years as being the head coach here at New Ulm High School, Coach Jim Senske has collected 22 South Central Conference titles, including another this season. The New Ulm Eagles Baseball Team has been primarily lead by the seniors, with a few juniors stepping up into different positions. Through May 10 the Eagles had spotted a 13-3 record, with a blazing 10-0 in the SCC. Their only three losses came against the section foe Mankato West, the number one ranked Cretin-Durham Hall, and St. Paul Johnson.

This year, the Eagles' pitching staff has been anchored by seniors, Aaron Heitzman, Dan O'Brien and Randy Baker. Juniors, Ryan Walters, Sam Nilson and Brandon Zenk have also appeared on the mound for the Eagles.

Throughout the season, timely hitting and constant runners on base have powered the Eagles in manufacturing runs. Leading the team in hitting is Heitzman around .470, senior catcher Dan Krzmarzick is batting around .400, senior second baseman Eric Schmidt is batting around .390, and senior outfielder Cory Wilson is batting around .370. Seniors Dan O'Brien and Pat Weber have been constant base runners that generally fuel the Eagles to score runs. Juniors Mark Boettger, Travis Fleck, and Mike Newman have also contributed in the hitting department.

The Eagles have only a few games remaining, including away games at Minnetonka and Lakeville. Coach Senske hope that his team can pull off a couple more wins heading into the region playoffs to assure a first or second seed. That would also include a first round bye, which helps rest the pitchers' arms. The key to New Ulm's success in the playoffs will have to be the pitching of Heitzman and the rest of the pitching staff.
