### Why so many Accidents for Students?

There are many things that students here at NUHS are well known for. We have our talented athletes, singers, dancers, actors, and intelligent scholars who take great pride in academics. But one reoccurring event which keeps popping up into hallway and classroom conversations is the continuous number of car accidents NUHS students have been recently involved in. Following is an inside look at the thoughts, feelings, and stories of several who have regretfully had the misfortune of being victims of car accidents.

The first student I interviewed was Colie Lomax, a junior. Colie was involved in a multiple car pile up accident approximately two months ago. She was on her way to a party, while traveling down Broadway near Casey's General Store, when her car was rear ended by another, and she was forced into the pile up. Colie's car obtained severe damage and physically she suffered from whip lash and damaged tendons in her back. Colie stated that the accident came to her as "a real shock." She said, "We were all headed to a party, so it (the accident) kind of put a damper on the fun we were looking forward to."

Also involved in the same pile up were, Mitch Stueber and Jeremy Fluegge, both Juniors, who were Frietag-bound in a car with three other friends when they also collided with another crash victim. Mitch referred to the accident as being, "a beauty." Fluegge's first comment referring to the collision was reportedly, "Good. I need a new car." Fortunately, they were able to find humor in the situation, for no one was injured. Fluegge's vehicle was totaled due to the damages, and he did indeed get a new car. Stueber also stated that the accident came as a shock, because ironically, while traveling down Broadway approximately one block prior to the accident, the guys in the car were making conversation about how, "it was funny that Fluegge had never been in an accident." How strange.

Jessi Bloedel, another Junior, was recently involved in an accident with a parked car in the High School parking lot one morning when she was coming

to school. Jessi commented that her accident was, "very embarrassing because a lot of guys I knew were talking in the parking lot, and they all saw it." Jessi also stated that car accidents are a real pain because, "they cost so much to repair."

Another accident victim who I spoke with was Brian Sprenger, a Junior, who collided with another NUHS student, Josh Luneberg, also a Junior, at an icy intersection one afternoon. Sprenger was heading west when Luneberg, heading south, was unable to yield as a result of "bad driving conditions." Sprenger reported that his car received, "moderate damage to the front left end as a result of the accident. The bumper was split, and the dollar amount of damages was estimated at \$2,000." Luneberg's vehicle suffered suffered severe damage to the passenger side. Josh commented that the fault lies, "50-50" between the two drivers. Brian reported only one piece of advice to the other drivers. "Always yield to your right." Although his vehicle was moderately damaged, Sprenger stated that he, "holds no grudges about the accident because he is a loving, caring, and compassionate individual." Luckily, nether driver was

One of the most talked about car accidents was one involving Laura Meier and Bill Bastian, both Juniors. The two were traveling in Mankato, when Laura (driving) rear ended another vehicle as a result of bad driving conditions. Laura commented, "My first reaction after the accident was to get out of the car and yell at the driver in front of me. Then all of a sudden,

I realized that Bill was still in the car, and he'd been hurt. I then ran back to make sure he was okay." Bill's face had gone through the windshield, and he received many stitches, which made it necessary for the Eagle wrestler to wear a protective face mask while wrestling for quite some time after the accident. Laura was not injured. Her side of the vehicle had an air bag.

Megan Clark, a Junior, was recently involved in a car accident. Megan was driving west up a side street hill when the sun got in her eyes, and she collided into the back of a parked Heartland Express Bus. Megan commented, "The accident was really embarrassing. And it's a real pain when your car has to be in the shop so long to get fixed." Megan, fortunately, was not injured in the accident.

Jacob Emmeck, a sophomore, was recently involved in a minor accident. As he backed out of his girlfriend's driveway, he failed to see a parked car out in the street and smashed into it. Jake said that, "I was really scared that my dad would get mad at me, but everything worked out all right in the end."

I, a senior, was also involved in a car accident. I was heading to school at approximately 8:00 A.M. when, driving south on Garden Street, I came to the four-way stop on Fifth North and Garden. I made my stop and proceeded to cross the intersection when the vehicle to my right failed to stop at his stop sign and collided directly into my car. My immediate reaction was to make sure that my little sister was okay. (She was riding in the passenger seat.) Also in

the vehicle were my younger brother and a friend of his in the back seat. Of course, being the girl I am, I immediately started crying hysterically. My sister's reaction, on the other hand, was, "That was fun! It felt like a roller coaster ride!" My brother and his friend comforted me while my sister laughed, and my parents were very supportive. My car was totaled, but fortunately, my dad bought a new one a week later

Unfortunately, the number of accidents among NUHS students does not seem to be decreasing at the present time. What is the reason? Has this winter caused too many days of "bad driving conditions"? Does New Ulm not have enough traffic regulation? Or are teenagers simply reckless drivers? No one knows exactly. On the up side, though, the majority of the accident victims interviewed in this article have been able to find humor in their situations and move on in life uninjured. With major events such a Prom and Graduation nearing quickly, we should all use caution and safe driving techniques when on the road. At one point the team's record stood at 4-0 until the state-ranked Waseca took a win from the Eagles for the first time of the season. However. New Ulm bounced back knowing they had to remain undefeated to obtain the South Central Conference title. They did just that by beating Fairmont for the first time in fourteen years. Because of this big win, New Ulm tied for first place in the SCC along with Waseca and Fairmont; something that has not been done for a decade and a

Although New Ulm is a fairly young team, they possess an extreme amount of depth. Even though there are three seniors, the future still looks bright for this youthful, but experienced team. The Eagles only have opportunity for improvement, which means they are virtually unbeatable when it comes to the regular season.
