



Miss Jean Treadwell's plans are quite indefinite, but she indicated she may take a trip to the New England states.


Mr. Tyrrell will remain in New Ulm this summer, but he also hopes to do some fishing.


Miss Dorothy J. Wark will be at her home in St. Paul through the entire summer.


