It's hard to believe that on August 29, 2005 lives were changed in the blink of an eye. Hurricane Katrina hit the northern gulf

coast leaving approximately 2 2, 0 0 0 p e o p l e homeless, scared, and in dire need of aid. The Superdome acted as a home for thousands of people left homeless.

Katrina came unwelcome with winds reaching over 100 miles per hour and rain that caused massive flooding along the coast. Waves of theft and scams also infected the coast with desperate people robbing abandoned stores and homes. Over 800 National Guard troops were sent in responding to the many-trapped people in their homes and to help keep order.

Along with the wave of damage the hurricane brought, came a wave of love donations and support. Millions of

Americans reached out in numerous ways, giving blood, money and support. Even though New Ulm was not hit by the hurricane, students and staffstill found it in their hearts to give to the

Student council sponsored Kash for Katrina.

The Student Council adviser, Mrs. Kirsch stated that many homerooms collected money over two weeks to be donated to the Red Cross. The homeroom with the most money collected was rewarded. Sra Tasto's homeroom collected about \$300 to be donated and won by far. At the end of the two-week collection period the total amount of money collected amounted to about \$310.50.

Although everybody at NUHS did not meet the \$1,000 goal Mrs. Kirsch feels that collecting the money was a big success.

Around town there was also collections and benefits. Tunes for Katrina featured bands that included Kingshift and The End, along with other bands that played for 12 hours with the money being donated to Katrina victims. The Hy-Vee grocery store also held a teddy bear drive, where teddy bears were collected and donated to the small victims of the Hurricane.

Even tough New Ulm was not directly affected by the damaging winds and rain; the people in the coast are directly affected by the loving support they received by the people of New Ulm If you have not yet donated or would like to there are many ways that you can still be of a help. the juniors, but the juniors and sophomores picked it up towards the end. A surprising group of four sophomore guys ended up gaining six points for



Q: What do you want to see while you are here in America?





The team has shown they have it at times, yet they still struggle to reach their full potential. According to senior captain Abby Bernard, practices go very well. So it's not that the two and a half hours


everyday after school don't benefit them. They work hard, especially in pre-season when practices are six intense hours a day.




Coach Gordon says that if she could change one part of the season it would be, "Having another shot at the five game matches and performing more consistently."


