## Driver Training Class Set to Start June 1

Fifty-one students have registered for the Drivers' Training Course, under the supervision of Mr. Ness. The lessons will be given from June 1 to the middle of August. The registration fee is \$2.50.

Each student is given a lesson one hour a day, five days a week for three weeks. There are two students in the car, one in front and one in back. For one-half hour each day, a student observes; then, for one-half hour, he drives, while the other student observes.

When Mr. Ness was contacted concerning the course, he had this to say: "Too often the purpose of a drivers' training program is misunderstood. The primary purpose of the course is not to prepare a student for the test alone, but to develop in him safe-driving habits. Sometimes an individual who can handle a car very well is a poor driver because of his poor driving attitudes. We try to stress attitudes more than skills."

## Awards Given to Students At Two Assembly Programs

A steady parade of students marched on and off the auditorium stage Thursday morning and evening at New Ulm High School to receive extra-curricular awards.

Underclassmen received their awards in a morning assembly while seniors were given their honors during an evening program.

Seventeen students won what are considered major honors. They included winners of trophies and membership in the coveted national honor society.

John Hillmer and Elizabeth Rolloff were awarded the American Legion trophies. The award is selected by the faculty on the basis of 40 per cent citizenship, 40 per cent extra-curricular and 20 per cent scholarship.

Both made frequent appearances on the stage to receive awards Hillmer, who was selected as the school's most outstanding athlete by the New Ulm Club recently, had also won letters in basketball and football, a chevron in baseball, was a member of the honor society and also received the all-activity award for earning 2,500 or more points in two or more departments.

Hillmer is the son of Edgar Hillmer.

Miss Rolloff, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Rolloff Sr., also won a series of awards. She was among the honor society students, won the activity key, a music chevron and scholarships to Augsburg and the University of Minnesota and received a commendation from the Merit scholarship tests for finishing in the upper two per cent of the seniors taking the test in the nation.

### Upper Third

Membership in the national society is made up of seniors in the upper third of the class but not more than 15 per cent of the class may be selected. Service, leadership, character and scholarship are the four qualifications on which membership is based.

The only other major awards which are for the entire class in scope are the Harry G. Dirks and Tante Meyer Memorials and the

Josten activity awards.

The Dirks and Meyer memorials are awarded to senior boys and girls who have shown high character, done average or better school work, and taken advantage of the opportunities offered them during high school.

The Dirks award went to Ralph Menk and the Meyer to Lenore Schnobrich. Miss Schnobrich also received the activity key, a library letter, shorthand pin and membership in the honor society. Menk was also in the honor society group.

### From Honor Points

Gary Schiller and LaVonne Roenstad were the recipients of the Josten senior awards, which go to one senior boy and one senior girl who have earned the greatest number of honor points during their attendance in senior high school.

Schiller received 16,045 points in agriculture, athletics and forensics. Miss Roenstad earned 13,128 in forensics, student council, scholarship, journalism, music and girl's athletic association.

Miss Roenstad also received the Vogel degate trophy, was in the honor society and received the GAA letter and two chevrons in speech and in music.

Schiller earned a letter in football and chevrons in baseball, gymnastics and three in agriculture.

Sandra Leske and Corrine Diedrick, two more honor society students, were co-holders of the Lewis B. Krook commercial trophy for making the most progress in that department. Each also received a shorthand key.

### Besemer Honored

The top agricultural award, the DeKalb achievement, went to Dayle Besemer who was Minnesota's star dairy farmer this year and has won a number of awards during the past school term.

Bruce Lentz received a scholarship invitation from Hamline, complete details of which are expected to be released soon. He, too, was a member of the honor society, earned the activity key and received three music chevrons.

The Bausch-Lomb science award went to Roger Edwards and the Eckstein music trophy went to David Young. Young also received three music chevrons, the activity key and was one of the honor students.

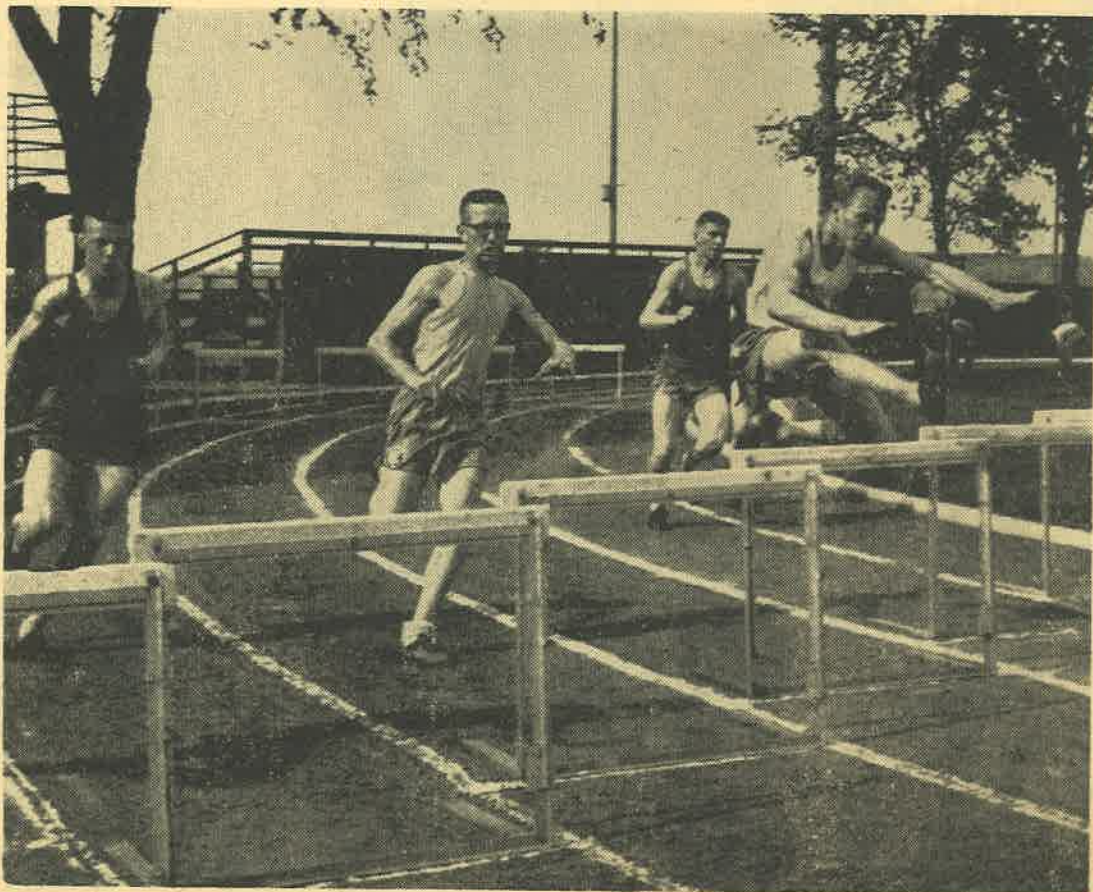
## New Ulm Tips Gibbon
