A jolly addition to the English department for the last nine weeks has been Mr. James Preisinger, a graduate of NUHS.

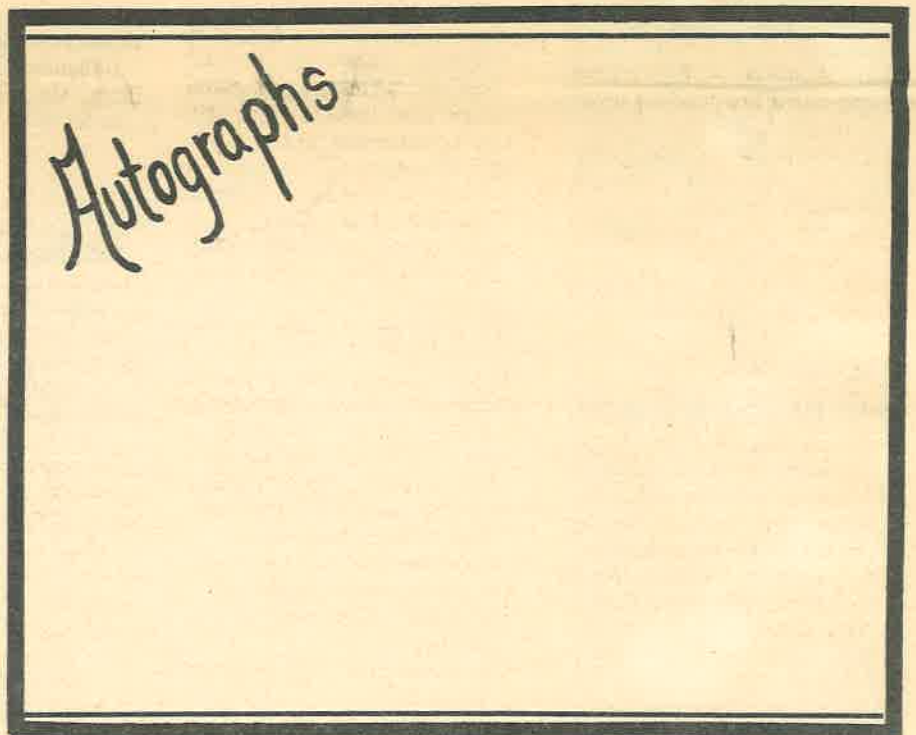

Redwood Falls and Winthrop tied for second with 36 points. Fourth place went to Morgan with 30 points.

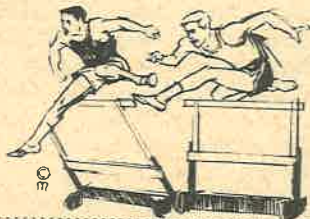
The Eagles had four first places, same as Redwood Falls, but some seconds, thirds and fourths settled the meet.

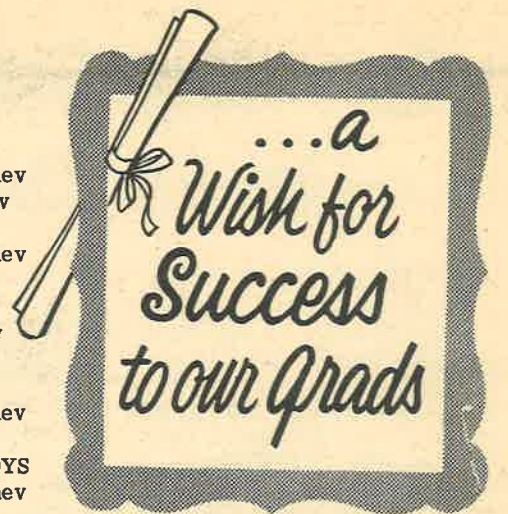

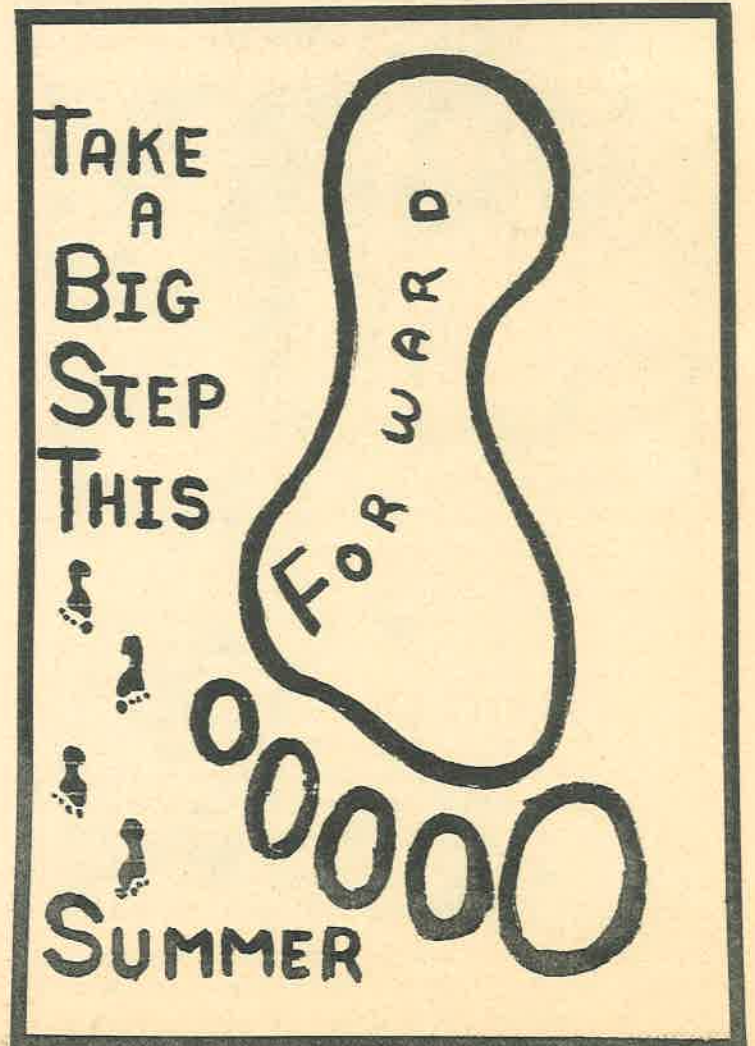

The Swing Band Banquet was held on Tuesday, May 23, at the Tropicana.

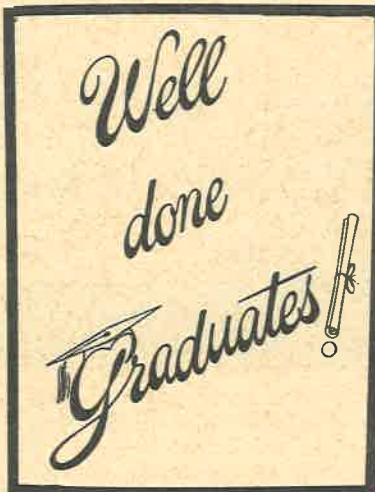
