In serious interpretation,

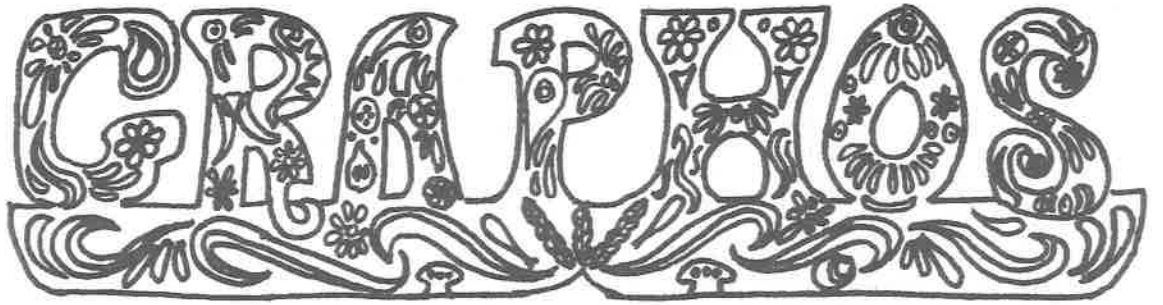

From Ray Christensen's "On the Go" - 19 Nov. 68 - WCCO Radio . . .

In 1964, Clifton Cushman of Grand Forks, North Dakota, failed to qualify for a second consecutive United States Olympic team when he tripped over a hurdle and fell. It was a great disappointment to him. But a few days later, he turned his disappointment into a challenge to the youth of his home town with an open letter to the Grand Forks Herald. This is that letter . . .

"Don't feel sorry for me. I feel sorry for some of you.

Last Sunday you may have seen the U.S. Olympic Trials on television. If so, you watched me hit the fifth hurdle, fall and lie on the track in an inglorious heap of skinned elbows, bruised hips, torn knees and injured pride, unsuccessful in my attempt to make the Olympic team for the second time.

In a split second all the many years of training, pain, sweat, blisters and agony of running

Are you interested in Vietnam, poverty, education, the draft, black and white, the AFDC, war and peace, migrants, rural life, the cities, jobs?

## Baseball Team Faces Tough Opposition

New Ulm High School's baseball team sets out to recapture the District 10 baseball crown this season amid some of the toughest competition, especially pitching, ever in the area.

Practice for baseball started Monday, March 10, in the gym. When it warms up considerably, the team will practice outside.

"This is one of the toughest schedules we've had," stated head baseball coach Jim Senske. Mr. Senske said he scheduled games with strong teams with experience so as to develop by tournament time. First regular season game is Monday, April 7, at Sleepy Eye while the tournaments start May 19.

Coach Senske said the team's strong points at this time are the front line pitching and catching. The outfield is expected to be fairly strong while the infield will be lacking experience, with three of the regular infielders graduated. Overall team speed will be better than average, according

to Coach Senske. Hitting must improve over last year, especially against the tough pitching the Eagles will face this season. Defense is somewhat of a question mark, but Coach Senske expects it to "improve with experience."

Returning regulars from last year are Doug Bode at catcher; Scott Backer in the infield; and Mark Zeise and John Roloff in the outfield.

Mr. Senske feels that Redwood Falls and Gaylord will be the toughest two teams in the district with Fairfax, Springfield, and Franklin as dark-horses. Hutchinson and Fairmont are expected to battle for first place in the South Central Conference with St. Peter as a possible champion.

"Our season will pretty much depend on our infield defense," stated Coach Senske. Then he concluded with, "Because of our long, tough schedule, we must develop some strong second-line pitching."

## Tracksters Look to be Tough for Districts

The NUHS track team started practicing with long distance running Monday, March 10. The tracksters are coached by Gramer "Skip" Davis.

According to Coach Davis, the schedule is long, with two indoor meets and 11 outdoor meets, weather permitting. The first meet is the South Central Conference indoor meet at Mankato State College on March 31. The other indoor meet is set for April 10 against Waseca and Owatonna, also at MSC.

Returning regulars include only three lettermen: Bob Kaiser, Charles Marti and Joe Bernardy. In all, 31 senior high boys are out for track, which

includes only four seniors, 11 juniors, and 16 sophomores.

Mr. Davis feels that the team's strong points lies in the distance running, from the 440 and up. Weak points are expected to be the dashes and weights. However, Coach Davis points out, "We hope to be tough in all categories by District time."

He feels that St. James will be tough in the South Central and Redwood Falls is favored in the District competition.

With so many underclassmen out for track, Coach Davis feels that New Ulm will be a tough team by district time and for next year.

The team will do some running, play a little basketball, volleyball, etc., to get in shape. When the weather warms up the players will head for the courts around town to practice for the first meet.
