Summer School Organized

Summer school for junior and senior high school students will begin on Monday, June 2, 1969, and continue for six weeks, ending July 14. No classes will be held on Friday, July 4.

Summer school sessions have three main purposes:

1. Remedial—Make up courses for students who have failed and additional reading help for those having difficulties.
2. Credit—Senior High courses available for those students who want to gain credits toward high school graduation.
3. Enrichment — Courses available for those students who want to gain knowledge in subjects that they would not find time to take in the normal 3-year senior high school sequence.

The summer school day begins at 8:00 a.m. and runs until noon. All senior high one credit courses run for four hours per day for a total of 120 hours of instruction. All remedial courses are in session for two hours per day. A few enrichment and one-half credit courses are in session for two hours per day. A student may take two two-hour classes.

Students who register for summer school must attend all sessions if they plan on receiving a credit. Since instruction is concentrated, each day of absence is equal to four absences during the regular school year. Students planning camp attendance, trips or other activities which conflict with school attendance must choose between school and the conflicting activities. Absences will be permitted only in cases of illness or extreme emergency as determined by the summer school principle.

Each pupil who is not a resident of the high school area of Independent School District #88 must either pay the tuition during the first week of summer school or bring a letter from the superintendent of schools stating that the tuition will be paid by his district. The tuition charge will be \$60.00 for four hours of instruction per day for the six week session and \$30.00 for two hours of instruction each day during the six week session.

Senior High School registration must be made in the office of the senior high school guidance department. Deadline for registration is May 5.

The following courses will be available for credit and enrichment at the senior high level:

- WORLD HISTORY, 4 hours per day for 6 weeks, 1 credit.
- SOCIAL 12, 4 hours per day for 6 weeks, 1 credit.
- ENGLISH 10, 4 hours a day for 6 weeks, 1 credit.
- ENGLISH 11, 4 hours a day for 6 weeks, 1 credit.
- GENERAL METALS, 4 hours per day for 6 weeks, 1 credit.
- MACHINE SHOP I, 4 hours per day for 6 weeks, 1 credit.
- MACHINE SHOP II, 4 hours per day for 6 weeks, 1 credit.
- ABC STENOGRAPHY SHORT-HAND 11-12, 2 hours per day for 6 weeks, 1/2 credit.
- PERSONAL TYPEWRITING 9-12, 2 hours per day for 6 weeks, 1/2 credit.
- BIOLOGY I, 4 hours per day for 6 weeks, 1 credit.
- HORTICULTURAL SCIENCE, 4 hours per day for 6 weeks, 1 credit.

Seniors Become Business Execs

"Big business" has become the phrase for about 30 NUHS seniors during their last quarter of high school. Several of the Senior Social classes of Mr. Ruthenbeck are engaged in heated competition to see who can manage big business the most profitably.

The big business causing the stir is a Management Simulation Game, a computer program originally created by a group UCLA professors then changed further by other universities and revamped by Honeywell for use in their system. The program is true-to-life yet not as complex as real business. If he plays correctly the student has an excellent opportunity to learn the intricacies of economics. Each team of two to five students must fill out a quarterly report (each time the game is run on the computer constitutes a quarter) in which they report how much their product will be sold for, the production volume, research and development, advertising, plant investment, size of dividend, and the number of quarters.

Mr. Ruthenbeck collects the quarterly reports and checks to see that they are filled out correctly. Mr. Trapp runs the program through the computer, always running the teams from the same industry together. Teams with the same industry number compete for a percentage of the total (100 percent) sales of that industry.

The Eagles had nine hits, and capitalized on six Fairfax errors and six walks to keep the basepaths something like the 5 o'clock rush hour.

Big hits for New Ulm were two doubles by Steve Schlottman, a triple by Frank Whitcomb, a double by starting and winning pitcher Larry Dorschner, and a double by Curt Dunham.

Schlottman ended the day 3-3 with the two doubles and five runs-batted-in.

Dorschner hurled the first four innings and Whitcomb pitched the fifth.

In the second game, Bill Dittrich fired a two-hitter as the Eagles banged out seven hits to win 4-1. Dittrich struck out nine and walked three as he baffled the Trainers with his good curve ball.

In the second contest, Backer was 1-1 and Gary Untiedt 2-3.

The game also marked the debut of Scott Backer's now-famous "new bat" that has helped his hitting considerably—or so he says.

NU Finishes Third At Triangular Meet

Pole vault was the outstanding event for New Ulm in a triangular meet against Owatonna and Faribault. Jeff Lowinske and Charles Marti collected 8 points as Jeff came in first, and Cheez second. The meet, held on April 10, saw NUHS finishing a distant third. Steve Peterson compiled the Eagles' only other second in the mile with a time of 4:57.1.

An abundance of thirds and fourths were added to complete the 22 1/2 points. They were thirds by Ken Nelson in the mile, Larry Gulden in the 880, and Don Johnson in the long jump, with a leap of 18' 4 1/2". There wasn't an earned run in the game as fielding miscues broke up a battle of pitching.

The visiting Eagles had all their five hits in the first three innings off New Ulm starter, sophomore Bill Dittrich. With runners on second and third with nobody out in the third, Coach Jim Senske brought senior righthander Steve Schlottman to the mound. Schlottman fanned the first batter and got the next two to pop up trying to bunt.

New Ulm scored three times in the last of the fifth without a base hit. Frank Whitcomb had life when his pop fly was dropped. He stole second and scored when John Rolloff's

grounder was thrown past first base. Then Doug Bode's grounder was booted.

With runners on first and third, Bode took off for second and the pitcher made the play on him. Meanwhile, Rolloff streaked for home and a nifty slide just eluded the catcher's tag and New Ulm was up 2-1. Then Bode got the steal sign for third base and the errant throw into leftfield allowed him to score.

New Ulm's final two runs came in the sixth. Gary Untiedt doubled. Dan Alwin was safe on an error. Walks to Steve Ahlness and Whitcomb forced in one run while the second scored on Rolloff's sacrifice fly.

Only two other New Ulm hits were singles by Scott Hendricks in the first and third innings.
