
You've come a long way Baby. To get where you've got to today!

LUVERNE - Strong running and a tight defense gave New Ulm High School Eagles a well deserved 14-6 win over Luverne here Aug. 30. The season opener for both teams was played in a slight drizzle and at times a downpour.

New Ulm got its first touchdown with only 40 seconds re-

maining in the first half. Halfback Scott Backer scored it from four yards out. Extra

Luverne's only touchdown came early in the fourth quarter. It was set up by a 32-yard pass from quarterback Tom Sedlacek to End Jerry Bartholomous. The same two combined for a touchdown pass of 10 yards. The run for extra points failed.

point attempt by Scott Hendricks failed.

With 6:04 to go in the third quarter the Eagles made it 14-0 when Steve Martinka scored from the two yard line. Backer ran for the extra two points.

Luverne tried a fieldgoal attempt in the second quarter from 22 yards out. Rick Serie filed in making the three points. Luverne had made it to

the five yard line of New Ulm, but was pushed back 15 yards by a clipping penalty.

Luverne advanced to the New Ulm 10 yard line late in the fourth quarter. George Eichinger picked off a Sedlacek pass and returned it to the Eagles 40 yard line. The Eagles then ran out the clock.

MARTINKA, senior fullback, picked up close to 100 yards on


the ground, including runs of 22, 29, 12 and 14 yards.

Wells Tops Eagles In Home Opener

Wells unleashed its powerhouse offense on the New Ulm High School Eagles here Saturday, and came out with a 60-20 victory.

It was the second game of the season for both teams. New Ulm, after a 14-6 win over Luverne last Saturday evened its record at 1-1. Wells, a 50-8 winner over Blue Earth last week, is 2-0.

The Wildcats took the opening kickoff down for a touchdown in the first quarter, with a big 62-yard pass play from quarterback Steve Schultz to speedy halfback Tom Wetzal. The conversion was good for an 8-0 game.

With only 22 seconds gone in the second period, Wells' halfback Dirk Berger scored the first of his three touchdowns on a 16-yard end run.

The Wildcats then unleashed the passing attack, with Schultz hitting three of three in a 78-yard drive for a touchdown. Schultz hit Wetzal from four yards out for the score.

The Eagles got their final touchdown in the fourth quarter when Martinka crashed in from the 11-yard line.

With the score 16-0, the Eagles rallied for a score on the ensuing kickoff. Quarterback Scott Hendricks rolled into the end zone for six yards and the TD to cap a 65-yard drive.

Wells reserves scored two TDs late in the fourth quarter.
