## BASKETBALL QUINT BEATS LAMBERTON 22-27 LOSES TO REDWOOD FALLS 18-17

### HIGH SCHOOL GIRLS DEFEAT LAMBERTON WHILE NICOLLET DEFEATS SECOND TEAM

#### GOOD GAMES

##### LAMBERTON GAME—BOYS.

On Friday the fourteenth, in a game which had a whirlwind start, which was fast all the way through and also had a whirlwind finish until the last minute, the New Ulm High School quint defeated the Lambertton five by a score of 27 to 22. The game was the best which has been witnessed by the High School fans, thus far this season. The Lambertton five were a strong aggregation and they made our quint work some to win. The score was a tie at three or four different times but the New Ulmites were always the first to break it. The first minute of play was the only time Lambertton was ahead and that was by one free throw. From then on New Ulm took the lead and showed some fine teamwork throughout, excellent passing being a main feature.

As was stated Lambertton made the first point by a free throw; then a free throw by "Doc" Hamann for New Ulm tied the score. However, another free throw by Lambertton broke the tie. Then "Snooks" Herzog gave us the lead by tipping in the first two-pointer of the game. A great many fouls for holding were called. "Doc" shot nearly every one. After a few more free throws by both teams, Snooks broke loose again with a long shot, then a free throw by "Doc," and it seemed as if New Ulm was really beginning to hit its stride. The passing was good. A basket by Nigg of Lambertton and a free throw by "Doc" ended the first quarter.

##### Second Quarter.

In the beginning of the second quarter our fellows had a very strong tendency toward scoring. This was starred by a free throw then a short shot by Herzog after which our center, Joe Schueller, dropped in a long shot, then "Doc" Hamann nearly raised the roof by making a spectacular shot from the center ring. Lambertton guarded very closely but were not able to score until nearly the end of the quarter after "Doc" had scored two free throws. Each team got a free throw before the half ended with the score of 10 to 12 in New Ulm's favor.

##### Too Many Personals.

The third quarter was played hard by both teams. Two of Lambertton's

men went out on personals at this time and 'tis said that this weakened them somewhat. "Doc" shot three free throws during the quarter while Lambertton scored three two-pointers, making the score dangerously close at 20 to 18. The New Ulm quint slowed up slightly during this period while Lambertton seemed to be still strong. However, when two free throws by Lambertton at the beginning of the quarter, tied the score, the locals fought desperately and at last "Doc" found the hoop, but Nigg of Lambertton came back at us and tied the score. A free throw by "Doc" broke the tie and Joe gave a larger lead by another two-pointer. "Doc" again found the hoop for a basket, then New Ulm used strategy. They began stalling under the Lambertton basket and Lambertton was then practically helpless. There was less than a minute left and at last the shot rang out ending the game. New Ulm. Lambertton.

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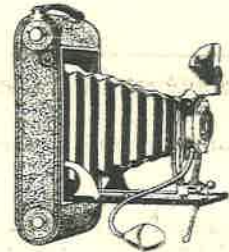

"Doc" shot another foul which was again followed by another field goal. At this time the excitement of the Redwood crowd was very great, especially when they netted two more baskets. The playing during this quarter was exceptionally rough, Redwood making many good tackles. Thus the first half ended 14 to 6 in favor of Redwood.

In the third quarter the team began to find itself and understand the football tactics which their opponents used. Time and time again they worked the ball down the floor only to miss the shots. In this quarter New Ulm scored a free throw and a field goal while Redwood scored one field goal.

#### Comeback.

A typical comeback was staged in the fourth quarter, "Doc" put one in from such a distance as to make even Redwood applaud. Schueller followed suit with one from the middle of the floor, as did Snooks. By this time he was scared and managed to drop in one more basket. But the applause was cut short when New Ulm scored another one making the score 17 to 18 with about three more minutes left to play. These last three minutes were critical ones and "Jens" and "Erbs" moved up, and with the rest began a regular bombardment of the basket, coming so close to it that there was no peace for the Redwood crowd until the whistle blew, when a real gasp of relief was heard.

#### Football Game.

Altogether, as a rough and tumble game it was good and very exciting, but as a real basketball game it was nothing. There were not more than six or seven fouls called during the entire game which proves the kind of game it was. However, we'll be ready for them when they come to New Ulm a week from Friday.

#### BASKET BALL—GIRLS' GAME.

A very exciting game was witnessed Friday, the fourteenth, at the High School Gym, in which the New Ulm High School team defeated the Lamberton girls by a score of 8 to 23.

#### Lamberton Outclassed.

Although the Lamberton girls put up a good game, our girls were superior. The ball was under the New Ulm basket most of the time while

the Lamberton forwards had a little chance to shoot, due to the close guarding of our girls. "Weedie" and Gertrude each got a basket in the first quarter. Our forwards displayed fine teamwork and were considerably faster than those of Lamberton. Our centers did some very good work, being very quick to pass and they managed to keep the ball in the New Ulm section most of the time. "Weedie" got two baskets in the first half while Gertrude rolled in three.

The Lamberton team decided to narrow down the 10 to 1 lead which New Ulm had and did some hard playing in this period, but our girls held them at bay at the same time scoring for themselves. "Weedie" made a couple of two-pointers, then a free throw by Lamberton found the third quarter at an end.

#### Lamberton Scores.

In the fourth quarter, the Lamberton team scores were frequent. They started in with one basket at the very beginning but our forwards came back with a basket apiece, immediately afterward. Then followed some hard playing, this being followed closely by first a basket by Esser, a free throw by Lamberton, then again another by Esser. Lamberton shot another basket and then they had hard luck in shooting for a couple of minutes but at last they found the hoop again for another basket. Close guarding by both teams was a marked feature at the end of this quarter. Lamberton tried desperately to score but the New Ulmites held them closely until the end of the game.

#### THE NICOLLET GAME.

Fans have been watching closely the movements of the High School first team but they might have let one thing slip their mind and that is this: that in order to have a first team, there must be a second team in order to give the first team the necessary practice. Now the seconds have been giving the regulars some hard scraps so a game was scheduled with Nicollet with hopes that the second team could make a respectable showing. The boys went down to Nicollet in two Fords and had supper. They then went to the school and shot baskets for a while. The Nicollet girls had a game with the St. Peter girls and this game was played first. The floor was very small, the foul ring overlapping, and there was a beam above one of the baskets, making long shots impossible. They had the advantage of knowing their own floor so that they could shoot long shots. The game was extremely rough. Nicollet had the one good basket in the first half and they scored nearly all their points in that period. Bruce tipped in the only basket made in the first half. After a great deal of scrapping and roughing, the half ended with the score 10-2 in Nicollet's favor.

#### Too Much Defense.

The seconds had played a rather defensive game in the first half but in the second half, with a change of baskets, the fellows started in to play more offensive and were determined
