New Ulm Wins District Game From Lamberton—Girls Sextette Easily Defeats Lamberton

Friday night the boys' and girls' basketball teams were victorious over Lamberton. The scores were: boys' game 19-8 and the girls game, 18-5. A larger crowd was expected, but the weather was bad.

Girls Defeat Lamberton, 18-5.

Last Friday the people of New Ulm were given the opportunity to see a fast girls' basketball game. During the first two quarters, both sides put up a good fight. "Hil," as usual, put in the first score for the high school and during the second quarter added two more points to the high school score and "Flossy" put in one free throw. The first half ended with a tie, 5 to 5.

With the score a tie, both teams buckled down to business and the last half of the game proved to be the turning point. The Lamberton team was weakened considerably during the last half, because her best guard was put out for fouling. "Slats" was put in for Verna during the last quarter and "Polly" for "Flossy," and deserve a lot of credit. During the last half "Ochsie" and "Sim" again showed their ability as guards by keeping Lamberton from scoring. "Hil" began rolling them in and "Flossy" put in another free throw and the "Red Jackets" carried home the bacon with a score of 18-5.

People who do not attend these basketball games are missing the opportunity of seeing one of the best girls' teams in southern Minnesota. They play their next game with Mankato Teachers' college.

Boys' Game.

Tomschin, Esser, Schaefer, Niemann and Arbes played at the first sound of the whistle. The quarter ended 9-3 in New Ulm's favor. New Ulm took the lead at the start and kept it during the game. In the second quarter Lamberton gained and New Ulm made only a free throw, making the score

10-6 in New Ulm's favor at the end of the first half.

A succession of baskets in the next half and New Ulm's score jumped, while Lamberton made but two free throws. Waterston went in for Arbes, Jones for Schaefer, Gastler for Niemann, Vogel for Esser, Fritsche for Tomschin, and later, Oswald for Waterston. Under these competent substitutes, Lamberton did little, which they did frequently through the game. The game ended 19-8.

New Ulm, it is to be remembered, was beaten by the DeMolay boys' team at Mankato some time ago. They will come here Saturday and the boys are out for their scalps. Come and see a good, clean, fast game.

DeMolay and Sleepy Eye Take Honors.

Friday the "Red Flashes" were beaten by the heavier Sleepy Eye team. The final score was 18 to 10, although the score was 6 to 6 at the end of the first half. The second half was tough and a number of the boys sometimes occupied positions level with the floor. Both teams were fast and we expect to beat Sleepy Eye at the coming game on our home floor. Arbes and Schaefer did the best work for New Ulm.

DeMolay Game.

The following evening the team played the DeMolay boys' lodge team of Mankato. This fast aggregation of high school boys trimmed New Ulm by a score of 32 to 16. It is to be considered that our team played a hard game the night before. DeMolay will journey here in the near future for a return game in which we hope to retaliate.

District Tournament Here.

Don't forget the district tournament will be held here on the Armory floor in the near future. This is the first time New Ulm has succeeded in getting the tournament and New Ulmites should support it.

N. U. H. S. TO ENTER NATIONAL ORATORICAL CONTEST.

The St. Paul Dispatch and Pioneer Press are sponsoring a national contest. The first prize is \$1,000, given for the best essay and oration on the Constitution. The grand finals take place in June in Washington. Another essay contest is being carried on by the Minnesota Society of the Sons of the Revolution. A prize of \$100 is offered for the best essay written on "The Supreme Court, a Bulwark of Safety in our American Form of Government." The essay must not exceed three thousand words. Edith Kjolstad was the winner of the local contest and her essay has been entered in the state finals. Verona Bemmels was rated second and Irene Ochs, third.

DEBATING TRIO DEFEATS WELLS BY 3-0 DECISION

MEET SPRINGFIELD HERE NEXT WEDNESDAY.

Friday evening, January 18, our High School Debating team again proved its superiority by defeating the Wells team. New Ulm upheld the affirmative of the immigration question, Wells the negative. Both teams showed thorough preparation and delivered their speeches in a very creditable manner. The New Ulm team, composed of Erna Grussendorf, Hilda Steinmetz and Howard Vogel showed exceptional teamwork and their presentation of the subject was superior to that of their opponents. Although the Wells team, composed of Marvel Hanson, Ralph Fisher and Arla Henjum put up a very good debate, yet they read most of their rebuttal, and due to this fact, their arguments were not as effective as those of the New Ulm debaters. Wells had previously defeated Mankato by a vote of two to one, while New Ulm had defeated Lake Crystal by a vote of 3-0. The judges, Supt. Struble of St. James, Supt. Mevig of Lamberton, and Supt. Everson of Hanska rendered a unanimous decision for New Ulm.

Up to date New Ulm has won 21 out of 24 judges' decisions in the past two years. This is a record unequaled by any school in the state of Minnesota. It is a record that every student should justly be proud of. Our prospects for another State Championship team are very bright. Hard work on the part of the team and coaches, along with the loyal support of the students and citizens, should put us across for state honors again.
