J. H. Siegel donated this cup for the purpose of encouraging speaking activities in the school. The first Siegel trophy contest was held in the year 1917. The rules of the contest are that no class should be represented by more than two boys and girls from each class, who shall be chosen from the entire group of contestants of each class sometime before the Siegel trophy contest. The class winning the greatest number of points shall have the honor of having temporary custody of the silver cup and shall have its class numerals inscribed on the cup. The basis of awards are: First place, five points; second place, three points, and third place, one point.

Howard Vogel was the first contestant from New Ulm to win first place at the State Contest, which he did last year. In 1921 Lillian Eyrich won first place of the girls and Howard Vogel won first of the boys. In 1922, Elizabeth Hintz and Howard Vogel were awarded first place, respectively, and in 1923, Erna Grussendorf and Howard Vogel were awarded highest honors.

### NEW ULM HIGH ENTERS DISTRICT CONTEST

Wednesday evening, February 6th, our High School Debating team won its third unanimous decision this season by defeating the strong Springfield team. New Ulm upheld the affirmative side of the important immigration question, Springfield the negative. Both teams were very efficient in delivering their respective arguments and showed thorough preparation and knowledge of the question. The New Ulm team, composed of Erna Grussendorf, Hilda Steinmetz and Howard Vogel showed superior teamwork and their arguments were very clearly presented to the crowd assembled in the High School auditorium. Although the Springfield team, composed of Lucille Paffrath, Lily Fleishmann, and Donald Sheffield presented their side of the question better than either of the two teams we have defeated this season, yet they were unable to make their arguments stand out as clearly as those presented by our team.

Springfield had heretofore met and defeated Sleepy Eye and Ivanhoe by unanimous decisions, while New Ulm has met and defeated Lake Crystal and Wells, also by unanimous decisions. During the time that Supt. Lenander of Winthrop, Principal Olson of St. James, and Prof. Kaufmann of St. Peter, who acted as judges, were casting their decisions the audience was favored with a pleasing selection by the orchestra. The decision was 3 to 0 in favor of New Ulm.

By defeating Springfield, "Stewart's Trio" are eligible for District championship. New Ulm will debate Windom next.

So far in the district contest this year, fourteen teams have been eliminated and ten will remain to contest for State Championship honors after February 22nd. No other team in Minnesota can claim such a record as New Ulm has made in the past two years. We have won 27 out of 30 judges decisions.

The next debate will be staged with the Windom team. This contest will decide the District Championship team of the second district.

The prospects of winning the State Championship are very promising and will remain so as long as the students and citizens support the efforts of our team. We have debated thrice this year in our own auditorium and with the affirmative side of

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


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
