

## N. U. DEFEATS WELLS IN MASTER DEBATE,

The local debating team, consisting of Roland Hohn, Alice Meile and Hilda Steinmetz journeyed to Wells Friday, January 16, when they engaged in a debate with the Wells debating team. The latter team was composed of Mabel Grey, Manville Oren and Wilhemina Weite, and was coached by Miss Agnes J. Anderson. The question for the debate was, Resolved: "That the United States Should Accept the Covenant of the League of Nations as It Existed July 1, 1924." New Ulm upheld the affirmative side of this great issue while Wells supported the negative side. In their main speeches the two teams were evenly matched, but in the rebuttal the New Ulm team far surpassed their opponents. The New Ulm team covered practically every point brought up by their opponents and presented their arguments in a clear and forceful manner.

### Decision of Judges.

The judges were Professor A. B. Morris, Professor Peterson, of Mankato Teachers college and County Superintendent Detamore of Mankato.

Professor Morris, who acted as sole judge for the Minneapolis Central High debate, and commented on the merits of the two teams after the contest, voted in favor of New Ulm in the Wells debate. He praised the New Ulm team a great deal and said that the debaters had improved wonderfully since the Minneapolis debate.

### Enjoyable Trip.

The New Ulm team and coach, R. J. Stewart, accompanied by Mrs. Stewart and Marion Reineke, reported a very enjoyable trip. The Wells people showed them that they had real debate spirit in their city by crowding the high school assembly to its greatest capacity. The New Ulm team and coach were shown every courtesy and the Wells people exhibited a good brand of sportsmanship.

### Statements of Team and Coach.

Mr. Stewart, in expressing his opinion about the team, said, "I am very proud of the debating team and feel that our prospects of winning the district cup are very good." Roland Hohn said, "I think for the size of the school they showed heaps of school spirit. Their boys glee club is the best I've ever heard and puts ours in the shadow. They have wonderful hospitality and they have a student body of which any town should be proud." Alice and Hilda said, "We have never, on any debating trip, enjoyed ourselves as on this last one."

### New Ulm-Tyler Debate.

The four schools which are left to compete for the district cup are Windom, Sherburn, Tyler and New Ulm. New Ulm will meet Tyler and Windom will debate Sherburn.

### New Ulm Takes Lead.

After the "Red Flashes" gained their lead of 5 to 3 in the first quarter the Ish-ta-ka-baks never came within more than two points of New Ulm's total. The half ended 9 to 7. New Ulm had the edge on the playing, however, the teams were nearly evenly matched. The third quarter ended 14 to 17 with New Ulm still in the lead.

But not until the last quarter in which accurate passing and keen "Red Flashes" raised the score from 14 to 17, to 28 to 21. Did New Ulm show her superiority?

Capt. Schaefer placed the ball in the basket four times, Tomschin secured a free throw and Sleepy Eye made three ringers and a free throw. Schaefer secured three more field goals and a free throw, Hamann got a free throw and a ringer and Niemann looped four and made a free throw. Sleepy Eye got seven free throws and three field goals.

The players received a feed in the Domestic Science rooms after the game. Mr. Hegstrom through his excellent coaching has led our boys to victory in four different games, Mankato, Nicollet, Gaylord, and Sleepy Eye.
