SLEEPY EYE UNEXPECTEDLY HOLDS NEW ULM DOWN

TIE DRAWN IN HARD FIGHT AGAINST ISH-TAK-HA-BA.

Curses on the luck! Foiled again! And the New Ulm High gridders were foiled in their attempt to wipe off Sleepy Eye last Wednesday. The boys had expected to gain a decisive victory on our age-old enemies, but the latter's enthusiasm was high for their Homecoming and Hobo Day, and put up such a fight that New Ulm could only draw a tie of 7-7. To add to all the disadvantages, a high wind seemed to hamper our team at every step.

The line was working spectacularly at first, but picked up later on. Swede was playing well throughout, but with the absence of Strate and Charlie Hintz, those positions were weakened. However, the backfield worked quite well, with Marks making remarkable gains of 32, 20, 15 and 10 yards, and "Mushy," as usual, playing a great game. Our one touchdown was made by Marks, with the goal kick made by Regelin.

Sleepy Eye's attack is strengthened by Fritz in the backfield, whose line plunges gained the touchdown for Sleepy Eye and also the extra point. However, when on the 5-yard line, New Ulm's stubborn defense held the opponents back for four downs before the goal was reached. Fischer and McCoy played custodianship for Sleepy Eye.

The first really crushing defeat of the season came to the New Ulm High gridders, a week ago last Friday, when a superior and larger St. Peter team pulled over a 44-7 victory on our men. However, New Ulm has no regrets, as they played the entire game with a battling spirit that forced admiration from all and showed the enthusiasm and zest Coach Harman has transmitted to his team. Outweighed 15 poundings to the man, New Ulm's hard-working line was continually pierced by St. Peter's swift backs. The out-of-town team has, perhaps, one of the best driving attacks in the state, and as such, New Ulm is not ashamed of the defeat.

The one touchdown for New Ulm was pulled by a fluke play—the most spectacular of the season. It occurred when Marks went out for a shoe-string play and, catching Regelin's well-aimed pass, ran 47 yards for a touchdown. Regelin's point after touchdown concluded all scoring for the local team, although they battled hard to the end. The boys "Never say die" motto was well displayed in their stubborn efforts to hold their opponents back.

St. Peter has an infallible backfield, with one or another of the Olson and Frawley brothers plunging through the line for great gains.

Both New Ulm's line and backfield worked earnestly and steadily. They were merely up against a superior team, and knew it; but they refused to give them the satisfaction of evidencing this knowledge.
