### SQUAD LEADERSHIP WORK COMPLETED

For the last few weeks a number of high school girls have been working to meet the requirements necessary to become squad leaders. The requirements are to attend three lectures on squad-leadership, to officiate at three volley ball games, to practice teaching fifth and sixth grade pupils on three occasions, and to pass a final test with an average of 85% or more. The pupils who have fulfilled all these requirements and have passed the test given last Wednesday are entitled to a squad leaders emblem. Two emblems are now being considered, but no definite choice has as yet been made. Both emblems contain the figure of a girl in lavender against a white background.

This work is valuable to both the squad leaders and the school, and much interest is being shown in it. A squad leader is taught to be prepared, confident, and energetic. Squad-leadership makes gym work more efficient, and tends to arouse the interest of pupils in gym work, thereby making them more efficient themselves.

### Loses to Balaton in Opening Game

#### Track Grind Begins

Through its victory over Montevideo, Balaton became the representative of the third region. They will enter their team in the State tournament to be held at the University of Minnesota, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday of this week. Seven other teams will also play in the contest, and experts rate this year's tournament the best in the history of the state.

#### Friday Night.

The jinx again came to follow New Ulm to the Regional tournament, and New Ulm dropped its first encounter to Balaton 21-23. The score tells better than anything else the type of game that was played. Although the Harmanites were outsize, they displayed good style of playing, and were in the lead until the last couple of minutes of play. Both teams played good basket ball, and Balaton happened to be leading when he whistle ended the game.

In the game previous to the New Ulm-Balaton encounter, Montevideo trounced Buffalo Lake 24-6, thereby winning the right to compete with Balaton on Saturday night for championship honors. In the Monte-Buffalo Lake game, the Lakers were held to one field goal, while the remaining 4 points were made via the free throw route.

#### Saturday Night.

At eight o'clock, Coach Harman lined up his team against Buffalo Lake to battle for consolation honors. New Ulm seemed to be playing in better form than in the previous encounter, and by the first half, had piled up a 12-0 score against their opponents. During the second half they collected another 20 points, while

holding Buffalo Lake to 4 points—these having been made from the free throw line. The final score stood 32-4 in favor of New Ulm. Thus, after having lost the championship game, they proved themselves capable of beating Buffalo Lake by a better score than Montevideo.

#### Balaton-Montevideo.

At nine o'clock, Balaton and Montevideo played for championship honors. Balaton led throughout the entire encounter; the only time Montevideo threatened was towards the close of the game, when they came within two points of Balaton. The final score was 27-25. The flashy Balaton quint showed their ability to play real basket ball even when the score was close, and with a team that averages better than six feet, they should go a long way in the State tournament.

#### Track Begins.

Nine lettermen form the nucleus for Coach Harman's track team. They include:

Besides these, Arthur Fussner won last year's annual cross-country run. Coach Harman has bright prospects for this year's team and at present is working on a relay team, which will be sent to the University Field House on April 2nd.

### GLEE CLUBS TO GO TO FAIRMONT

Instead of the usual annual contest, the various music organizations of the schools in this district are to have several festivals held at different towns in the district. The glee clubs and choruses are to have their festival at Fairmont on Friday, April 8. Nine schools are to be represented—Sleepy Eye, New Ulm, Mankato, Fairmont, Alden, Madelia, Sherburn, Winnebago, and Le Sueur.

In the afternoon, the junior high school groups are to present their numbers. The festival choruses are then to rehearse the two numbers, "Build Thee More Stately Mansions" and "Bridal Chorus," which they are to sing all together.

The evening program will consist of numbers sung by the various glee clubs. The two festival numbers will end the evening's performance. The massed glee clubs will be accompanied by an orchestra, the members of which will be picked from the different school orchestras in the district.

It is hoped that Mr. Morris, director of music in West High School, Minneapolis, will direct the glee clubs and serve as critic judge.

About forty-five people will represent the New Ulm High School. Plans are being made for the members to drive to Fairmont, so anyone who is willing to aid by furnishing a car will please notify Mr. Halling.
